

HEIRS

Romans 8:17 And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together.



18 For I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us.

19 For the earnest expectation of the creature waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God.



20 For the creature was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who hath subjected the same in hope,




Vanity, believers are put under it. It seems as if our life in this world has no meaning.

We are aliens in this world, pilgrims. (He 11:13)


21 Because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God.


22 For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now.



Nature is not in its natural state and we all know it. People and animals killing each other. We cannot live outside unprotected because creation is in rebellion.




even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of our body.



We wait for the completion of our adoption. That our bodies too will be saved and changed.


(Php 3:21, 1 John 3:2)

24 For we are saved by hope: but hope that is seen is not hope: for what a man seeth, why doth he yet hope for?



Hope is energy when a person is tired and seems like he is losing. Hope energizes him to continue. Hope comes from faith. Faith not just in God's Word but also in God, in His character.

25 But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it.
